SUPPORT FOR THE LAKES PROJECT FROM THE AUDUBON SOCIETY

The Tanasbrook office has received a letter from the Audubon Society of Portland in support of the recently approved lakes enhancement project proposed by Cleanwater Services.

Signed by Urban Conservation Director Bob Sallinger and Urban Conservationist Jim Labbe, the letter applauds Tanasbrook for approving the project.

"The project will have tremendous net benefits for urban fish and wildlife populations," the Society writes. "The proposed water quality improvements will enhance habitats for rainbow and cutthroat trout that inhabit Bronson Creek. Other sensitive aquatic species that inhabit the Beaverton Creek watershed, including Western Pond Turtle, will likely also benefit from the water quality improvements."

Tanasbrook can also expect to see improvements for local wildlife.

"We believe that this project will have significant benefits to terrestrial and avian wildlife species while hopefully reducing significant numbers of waterfowl problems associated with the complex," the letter continues. The Audubon's Wildlife Care Center receives dozens of ducks each year from the Tanasbrook Lakes and reports that they see more injured waterfowl from Tanasbrook than from any other single site in the Portland Metro area.

"This situation is a direct result of overpopulation caused by release of nonnative, non-migratory waterfowl and feeding of waterfowl by humans at the ponds," the letter details. "On several occasions we have also received ducks that have been the victims of deliberate human abuse. Reducing the population in the short run by allowing native waterfowl to disperse to other areas and capturing non-native waterfowl and finding them permanent homes, would be highly beneficial."

The Society has offered to work with Tanasbrook to facilitate this process and to develop policies and practices that will prevent recurrent problems in the future.

The Audubon Society also expects that the "enhanced environmental amenities" afforded by this project will contribute positively to Tanasbrook property values.

Due to the holidays, the HOA board did not convene in December. Similarly there is no manager's report for December.

CLUB HOUSE VANDALISM

Friday night, December 3rd, a pool cue was broken in the club house recreation room.

It is believed that several youths jumped over the exterior fence surrounding the swimming pool and got into the building through one of the pool doors.

Every year Tanasbrook battles against vandalism and takes steps to prevent further incidents, from securing exterior doors to having First Response set the club house alarm at 10pm. Still, we have not eliminated the problem.

While it is easier to prevent destruction of community property during the summer months, when the pool curator is on duty, keeping an eye on the club house from 5-10pm is a challenge the rest of the year.

If you witness an act of vandalism or even suspicious behavior around the club house or on any part of Tanasbrook property, please call the Washington County Sheriff's Office (503-629-0111) or First Response (503-229-0044) immediately. Help protect our community from further acts of vandalism and destruction of property.



Many people begin each New Year with hopeful promises about what they will do - or not do - in the coming twelve months. There are resolutions to drop those extra holiday pounds, to complete that old scrapbook project, or to stop smoking. In January, athletic clubs and gyms are bursting at the seams from the scores of people determined to get back in shape.

Come spring – sometimes even by February 1st – many well-intentioned resolutions have fallen by the wayside. It is not lack of desire or commitment that is to blame: often these resolutions are instead the casualties of poor goalsetting.

Goals must be achievable, or we'll fall on our faces each and every time. When making your own resolutions, keep in mind that achievable goals have several key elements in common: they are realistic, clearly stated, measurable, and time-dependent.

So what does an achievable goal look like? One of my resolutions in 2005 is to write two new books. Experience tells me that I can write a first draft in less than a month, so I know this is realistic. The measurement? Each draft must be at least 50,000 words. Time dependent? Book A must be done by June 1st, Book B by December 1st.

My clear goal statement might look like this: "I will complete a 50K-word draft of Book A by June 1st, and a 50K-word draft of Book B by December 1st."

Someone else might say, "I will lose 10

pounds by April 1st and be able to fit into my old jeans again."

So I've got my goal, but how will I get there? Success depends on mapping out the steps necessary to achieve the goal. To write a book, I need to do research and draw up an outline; then I will need to blocks of time to do the writing. My "goal road map" will consist of a schedule that incorporates timelines for each step: to have Book A done by June 1st, I may choose a deadline of February 1st for the outline to be done, with two-hour blocks of writing time slotted in my calendar each Tuesday and Thursday evening.

I will also want to ensure a supportive environment to help me meet my goal. This means clearing my space of anything that might distract me while I'm writing – television, radio, animals with toys, etc. - and making sure I have the necessary tools (e.g., computer and word processing software) at my disposal. For someone pursuing fitness and weight loss, this might mean investing in an exercise ball and clearing the cupboards of cookies and soda.

Additionally, I will talk about my goals with my family and friends, letting them know what I am doing and how I will get there. This allows the important people in my life to form a supporting network to further bolster my efforts.

I will still have to do the work, of course. but with an achievable goal, my "goal roadmap" in hand, and a supportive environment and supportive people around me, I am already that much closer to success.

Soapy Indoor Plant Spray

For indoor plants that are exposed to pollutants from heaters and stoves, a cleaning spray can boost health and deter diseases. This gentle spray cleans dust and dirt from plants and poses no risk to plants or animals. You can use it in your outdoor garden, too.

What You Will Need 1 tablespoon liquid, nondetergent soap 1 tablespoon liquid seaweed (optional) 1 quart lukewarm water pump spray bottle

Mix soap, seaweed, and water in spray bottle. Yields about 1 quart of plant spray.

No Parking

KERRY LAUER

Although the holidays have passed, friends and family may still come to visit. Unlike most condominium communities, Tanasbrook offers many parking areas for guests. Please ask your guests to park in a designated parking area.

As listed in the Resident Handbook (page 19) parking is not allowed:

- In front of or in a carport, garage, or driveway of another resident.
- In any area with "No Parking" painted on the curb or street.
- In front of any entrance or walkway to a unit.
- In front of any pathway through the common area (grounds).
- Next to any white curb.
- In any roadway pedestrian path.
- In more than one parking space.
- Within 15 feet of any corner with restricted visibility.

Any unused, inoperable, or derelict vehicles may not be stored at Tanasbrook. Other accommodations will need to be made for their storage.

If a parked vehicle reduces the width of the roadway to less than the 20 feet required by the fire code, your vehicle will need to be moved – or you may be fined \$1500 by the fire department! Parking in a manner that restricts access – such as in a fire lane – hinders the fire department's ability to get to a burning unit if need be and impacts everyone's safety.

The Tanasbrook office will be enforcing the By-Laws and rules in regards to parking matters to protect everyone's investment and for their safety.
